STANDARDIZATION POLICY STATEMENT

COPYRIGHT

1 POLICY STATEMENT

In order to sustain the business model of its standards development and maintenance programme, BSI asserts and rigorously protects its copyright over all its publications.

Contributions to a British Standard (including those derived from international and European standards) are accepted on the following terms unless otherwise specifically negotiated in advance of submission.

1. Contributions made by a committee member and others in the preparation of national standards and related documents are only accepted by BSI for inclusion in a standard on the strict condition that the committee member has the right or permission to contribute to BSI any and all copyright in such material. No material known to infringe another party's copyright shall be included in a standard unless permission has been obtained from the copyright holder.
2. Copyright of contributions by committee members are exclusively and irrevocably assigned to BSI and/or the international and European standards organizations, as the case may be.
3. Such assignment by committee members extends to exploitation, by BSI throughout the world.
4. The committee members accept that exploitation will take place without mention of their name.
5. A committee member is allowed to continue using his/her unique contributions provided they have been published prior to their submission to the standards making process. For the avoidance of doubt, in such cases the following principles apply:
 - i. Contributions can be used for the committee member's own use only. This includes use in internal company processes, documentation, design and specification, or use in specific scientific or technical publications.
 - ii. Where the committee member retains the right to use copyrightable contributions and transfers such rights to a third party, the third party is bound by these same rules as laid out in 5.i to 5.iv.
 - iii. Any use of such copyrightable contributions by the committee member must not adversely affect the promulgation and exploitation of the standard by BSI.
 - iv. A standard is viewed as a collaborative work, and therefore in the event of a committee member continuing to use the copyrightable contributions, he/she may not reference the standard as the source.
6. Reproduction in any form of any material published by BSI British Standards is subject to approval by BSI, and may entail payment of a royalty.

2 BACKGROUND

BSI British Standards is a non-profit distributing organization; any profits from the sale of standards are reinvested into the standards development programme. Although recognised by the UK Government as the UK National Standards Body (NSB), BSI receives limited government funding and for specific projects only and therefore relies on commercial exploitation of its output to fund the standard development and maintenance process. A robust development programme is essential to ensure that UK economic and social interests across all of the European and international standards organizations are safeguarded.
